Easter has arrived! We made the long way through Lent; some of us journeyed through the liturgical marathon that is Holy Week, with its multiple services leading up to the Great Easter Vigil.

Now we dwell in the weeks prior to Pentecost. Yes, we keep looking forward to the next event in the Christian year. Jesus has risen from the dead; in the coming weeks, as we hear in the Gospel stories, he will appear to many people. Those who believe in him will understand that he has conquered death. Jesus will tell them that he's leaving again but will send the Advocate, the Holy Spirit. So those who love and follow him live in tension still; of course, they want him to stay, forever. What will happen when the Holy Spirit comes? They do not yet know the day it will happen. All they can do is stay together and pray and hope that Jesus' leaving will not be soon.

Even after the great Resurrection has occurred, we continue to live in paradox and tension. We believe Jesus rose from the dead and that we, too, will one day be resurrected. In the meantime, though . . . in the meantime, life continues and people suffer, and the answers we want don't come, and Jesus the Man-God is nowhere to be seen.

In the meantime, much of the world around us acts as if there is no Resurrection at all. Those of us who follow Jesus have to stick together. We need to pray and worship together, remind one another of this strange reality we call the Christian life. It makes sense only if we take Jesus at his word—if we believe that his life merges with ours and that we are forever changed

And in the absence of Jesus who walked this earth centuries ago, what do we do?

We allow him to live through our bodies and voices, our thoughts and dreams, our arms and faces. We are the Body of Christ. This is not merely a nice metaphor; it speaks a reality by which we live as Easter people. Jesus now is with us, within us. He is also outside us, in others—we meet him especially in those who need our love, those we can feed, clothe, visit, heal, forgive, and love.

Easter is not magical. It is transcendent. Jesus is not somewhere else. Christ is everywhere—through him all creation holds together. He lives and breathes through his body, the Church.

So, what does it mean to live as Easter people?

It means we live as *a people*, all parts of Christ's Body working together toward a single purpose: love.

Change of Date for A Refugee's Story.

Wednesday May 4 at 7:00 pm.

We ask you to join us in person or by Zoom and meet Daniel, a Honduran refugee with ties to the people of McClure. He has shared his refugee escape with our youth and now we've asked him to come back to speak with the wider faith community. He will be speaking to us through a translator, Cooper Muirhead, a member of McClure.

Daniel's escape from Honduras, through the U.S. and into Canada is an amazing journey. He arrived here on Christmas Eve of 2019, hiding in the undercarriage of a train. He was alone in the dead of winter, freezing from the cold in only the clothes he was wearing.

Some of you donated furnishings for Daniel when he was finally released from the hospital in the spring of 2021, a year and a half after his arrival. He has been very grateful for the help given him by McClure and now would like to give back by sharing his story.

So come out and hear this fascinating story. Please let the office know if you will attend and if you will be attending in person or virtually.

OUTREACH & REFUGEE COMMITTEES

How is McClure's Outreach Money assigned?

The Outreach Committee would like to keep the congregation informed of how and where the funds in our budget are assigned. We plan to present 2 or 3 agencies per newsletter.

We consider agencies in these categories: In the World, In the Community and In the Congregation. For each potential agency we also consider their other funding, such as government funding, major sponsors, or fundraising efforts. We also look at emerging issues and needs in society.

The agencies presented this month:

- 1. Operation Eyesight (world): provides medical care for the blind/at risk, to the poor of the world
- 2. McClure Refugee Support (community): for our sponsored families; to provide financial aid and support towards integration into Canadian society.
- 3. New and Emergent Response (congregation/community): concerns and issues arise; new needs may require a quick response. (We used to build a small fund from the recycling bottles box but that use has also changed).

The History of McClure's Refugee Efforts- Part Eight

Yaseen Dakouri, his wife Heyam and their one year old child Aras arrived from Syria in 2015. Yaseen fled Syria when he was about to be conscripted into the army. He fled to Turkey and was working in Istanbul but had no job security. After arriving in Saskatoon, they both attended English classes two nights a week and Yaseem passed his driver's license. They would like to make friends with more Canadians so they can integrate into Canadian society.

Gebremeskel Eyasu, a single man, arrived in Saskatoon in 2015. He fled Eritrea, Africa because he was to be conscripted by the army. He walked and got rides across Sudan and Egypt until he reached Israel. He has a brother in Saskatoon who has helped support him. He now has a job with Agrium checking crops outside the city.

In 2018, the Al Obaidi family of 6 from Iraq arrived in Saskatoon. This is a joint sponsorship with three other groups: People of Praise, St. Philip's Parish and Nutana Park Mennonite churches. There is no information about the family. Our share of the sponsorship was \$10,000.

There has been little happening with Refugee applications for quite some time. Our committee works hard but there seems to be little action from the government. Covid 19 has also added to the problem.
