Reflection: Rev. Debra Berg

Prayer: May the words of my mouth and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you O God, our Strength, and our Redeemer. Amen.

There has been lots of talk these past few weeks about our church building. In particular talk about how to open for "in person" worship. It is exciting to think about being together again in our common worship space. We have already taken some baby steps as we figured out how to be safely open for funerals. In anticipation of our return, chairs were cleaned and the floors washed and polished. Banners have been dusted off and hung and plans for fixing the sound proofing cloth, that is drooping, is in process. We have fired up the sanctuary computer and projectors and we have put fresh batteries in all the places one needs to put fresh batteries. Elin and Shirley have got our instruments, the piano and the organ ready to go and have even been practicing as well as offering music for the funerals we have hosted.

Psalm 84, that Muriel read for us, touched my heart this week as it is a celebration of the temple as the dwelling place of God. The Psalm speaks of traveling to the temple in Jerusalem and of the awesome experience of entering that holy place. The Psalmist celebrates that there is nothing that quite compares with the temple - as the place that God is present to us. This psalm was most likely spoken and sung by pilgrims - who were looking for God – by those who desired to be in the Divine presence.

For the people of that time the Temple was a place to come home to. Even the sparrow builds a nest, and finds a home, in the temple. In the temple according to verse 3 - I meet "my King and my God," a double title which refers both to the ultimate power of God and the God of our personal lives. An experience in the temple could be both grand and intensely

personal. This Psalm was a reminder that God would meet Israel in a particular place.

I believe God continues to meet us in particular places.

We all need holy places; we all need a home. This past week was a very busy week for many of us as we opened the church building to three families who were saying goodbye to loved ones. And those loved ones were church family members. It was lovely to see several members of McClure United Church come to help support and care for the Davidson, Webb and Millar families. During the receptions afterward, as we drank coffee and enjoyed a sweet - I heard several McClure Church folk say how good it was to be in the church building - to be home again. It is an amazing thing to be in the temple. It is an amazing thing to come home.

I think this need to come home or be home is why for many the pandemic has been or is so very difficult. Many of us could not come or be home during lock down and that was hard. This summer has been good for our spirits as many have been able to travel again. Summer vacation is designed for home coming. Students return home from school and young parents bring their little ones home to grandma and grandpa's so that they can rest and connect in a new way to home. Summer give us time to travel to those landscapes that ground us and are home to us. For some that is where the waves crash against the shore and for others it is where the mountains play with sky and for others it is where there is nothing but sky and more sky. We are a mobile society. It is becoming a small planet. Home is important to our well being – we need home and sometimes we have to find home, or make a home, wherever we are.

That is what God's people in exile – those who would have sung the 84 Psalm where saying – they wanted to be home. They wanted to be in

that place where God was present. This is what the church tries to live out. When we are at our best we are a people with open hearts, open minds, open doors - creating a place to come home to. ///

I received a note earlier in the year from someone who worshipped with us for awhile and then moved away. Their life, like many of our lives was a path of healing. This person gave thanks for our church and the people of the church, they were grateful for the support and care received and was so grateful that what they could give was so warmly received. McClure was their home.

For most of us the Church is a home. A place to believe, a place to belong, a place to become. A place of safety. A home.

We need to come home to safety, home to grace, home to God and the 84th Psalm teaches us this truth. I love the translation that is found in Eugene Peterson book <u>the message</u>:

"One day spent in your house, this beautiful place of worship, beats thousands spent out on Greek island beaches."

There is the temple, the sanctuary. We look around and we see its beauty and maybe we remember something from the past, a wedding or a baptism or a stirring anthem or a word spoken to us by a preacher that seemed to be just what God might want to be saying to us. I have had weeks that were difficult--more negative than positive, more going out than coming in and I have sat down in our sanctuary, and I could almost hear ""come home, come home, you who are weary, come home."

The temple can be and is a place to know God – to be home in God.

Psalm 84 leads us to a further truth and that is that God chooses to dwell among us.

The temple is a physical place; you can go to and then in the Gospels, Jesus teaches us that his body is the temple, and that if it is destroyed God will raise it in three days (John 2). In Jesus the fullness of God's presence dwells. And that is temple.

Then later, in the letters of Paul, we discover that our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit - God dwells in us, and among us. We are the temple of God.

God's temple is in the hearts and lives of a transformed people. When someone comes to worship in a church, they may discover a beautiful sanctuary. And then they meet someone, and there is an acceptance, and a divine/holy love shared. And then they/we begin to see each other and we realize that it is the people who are also the temples. God is interested in holy places but God is just as interested in holy people.

And that is the business we are in, the business of building a temple, of offering shelter in the storm, shelter to the spiritually homeless.

God's people – you and I - are in the construction business. We are building something. To me it is the most important thing in the world, because it affects every other dimension of our lives. Worshipping in a holy place, being in the temple, being reminded that God not only lives in our temples, but that God lives in each of us. - That is our mission.

To be the temple, to be the dwelling place of God, is to say, with our words and with our actions, "This is a house of prayer for all people." To say, with our words and with our actions to one another, "You are a temple of the Holy Spirit and God dwells in you." To say, with our words and actions, "Come home, come home, you who are weary, come home."

May God grant us the wisdom and grace to be in the construction business. The construction of temples of brick and mortar – home to the

searcher. And temples of the heart – home to love and justice – rest and renewal. Home for you and me. Home for all.

who call McClure United Church home and all our siblings may be empowered to live out this call. Help us never stop learning about you and by your spirit teach us your way and give us courage to live as you desire.

Tender hearted God among our families and friends we know that some are suffering from disease and pain - from grief and loneliness from fear and despair - God we pray for these people, so precious to us, we pray for relief,, for peace, for the ability to sleep well and rise encouraged each new day.
