We are back! And yet, we have never stopped being here.

For months we have continued to "be the church" in creative ways: online Bible studies, discussion groups and committee meetings; parking lot outreach projects; telephone visits. We are also very grateful to have been able to offer worship with the use of technology.

And now, after careful consideration and the implementation of safety protocols, we are ready to invite you to return to in person worship. I am so grateful to be able to provide leadership to people I can actually see.

We are also grateful that we now have the technological ability to continue to offer online worship for those who are not yet ready (or are unable) to return to the church building. We will be livestreaming the 9:15am service each week. Even though we are limited to 75 people in the sanctuary, there is still room for all.

We don't promise a smooth transition. It's been 20 months since Debra and I led in person and its possible we've forgotten how to do it live. I can no longer stop, erase and repeat when I am sharing a reflection.

There will also, no doubt, be technical glitches as we try out the livestreaming platform. This will be a great time for all of us to practice grace and to lean heavily on our great sense of humor.

However, it may be, it will be a blessing!

We return on the first Sunday in Advent! Together we will be reflecting on hope, peace, joy and love as we wait to celebrate the birth of Jesus. How wonderful!

This year Debra and I are using a resource from Sanctified Art to guide us through this season. The theme for Advent is "Close to Home". I'm going to share with you the introduction to theme as printed in the accompanying devotional (which you can access on our website or Facebook page). This will give you a glimpse into what we will be experiencing over the next few weeks.

"When something hits close to home, it affects us deeply. The stories and scriptures of Advent are tender, heavy with emotion, and vulnerable. We hold the memories and truths of this season close to our hearts. Close to Home acknowledges that Emmanuel is with us, and yet, God's promised day—our everlasting home—is not fully realized. We long for God to come close.

The Advent and Christmas scriptures are rich with home metaphors and imagery. John the Baptist prophesies about the One who is to come, but reminds us that we are still wandering far from God's promised day; his message hits close to home, especially for those experiencing inequity and oppression. After receiving the angel's news, Mary retreats to Elizabeth's home, seeking refuge and safety. Christ is born in the midst of a journey home, in a crowded dwelling space amidst livestock and shepherds alike. The Magi travel far from home to pay homage to Christ, and, having been warned in a dream, they avoid Herod by traveling home another way. In these scriptures, home is both physical and metaphorical, something we seek and something we are called to build. Ultimately, God is our home and resting place. God draws near and makes a home on earth—sacred ground is all around us.

This Advent, may we be comforted by the One who dwells intimately with us. May we expand safety and sanctuary for everyone wandering far from home. May we come home—wherever home is found—to live fully with joy, hope, and courage."

McClure Youth Groups

On November 14, the junior and senior youth groups were joined by Daniel Paguada, who spoke about his harrowing journey from Honduras to Saskatoon, his life before fleeing the violence of his home country, and his efforts to build his life in Canada.

Through Cooper Muirhead's translation, the youth learned that Daniel made the difficult decision to leave his young children, career, and home behind, setting out on the long and perilous land route through Honduras, Guatemala, and Mexico. After multiple setbacks, including being apprehended by immigration authorities numerous times, Daniel eventually found his way into the United States.

From here, he embarked on the final leg of his journey north, tucked in the undercarriage of a train wearing mere street clothes and without food or water.

Daniel finally arrived on the outskirts of Saskatoon on Christmas Eve, 2019. After over 18 months of recovery in Saskatoon hospitals, and with significant support from McClure United Church, Daniel is now residing in an apartment on his own, working diligently to learn English and acquire all documentation needed to work and remain in Canada.

Daniel's story of survival is one of resiliency and commitment to a dream, but also a reminder of the conflict, uncertainty, and persecution which many individuals and communities continue to face.





Just some thoughts and feelings from Terry (Board Chair)

As you have most likely heard, the Board made a decision to hold in-person worship services in the Sanctuary at McClure starting on November 28, the First Sunday of Advent. This decision was made very carefully and with much thought as to "what that would look like" and we thank the Worship Committee for its planning and the Building Access Task Group for its guidance. You will find all the information about the set-up and procedures for worship in the Newsletter, the Website, and of course, the church office. I'm not going to talk about that part. What I do want to do is tell you a bit about how I am feeling because I am guessing that you might be having similar reactions and feelings.

During these past months, a feeling of uncertainty about what is the best thing to do has become the norm for me. I think twice before I enter the coffee shop, the grocery store, and even my mom's suite. I feel "teary," I don't know what to expect or plan.

I also find myself more overcome with joy. My granddaughter sent me a handmade Christmas card (yes, she's 4 and is starting her cards early!) I said, "thank you so much Clara, did you send me that card just for the fun of it?" She said, "no grandma, because we love you!"

I find myself smiling at the older couples holding hands while they are out for their walk. I think I have a new appreciation for others, knowing that we are all in this together.

I am nostalgic for the "good old days" before Covid, but I know that we're never really "going back," so instead I try to feel hopeful and optimistic for what lies ahead.

I guess what I really am trying to say is that I have gone through a trauma. I have to give myself time to adjust and be happy and comfortable "doing" again. For me that might mean wanting to continue with some Zoom meetings. I might feel very comfortable volunteering to make calls for the Phoning Tree or being in a small Fit After 50 exercise class at the church.

What I most want is to find places where I can once again be part of the McClure faith community. I might soon be at ease with being an usher or greeter at a Sunday service, or maybe work in the church office on Sunday morning. I look forward to new ways of helping with Outreach and fundraising projects. I can take it slow and ease in with joy...

And mostly I know that there will be a place for me at McClure!

December 2021

Junior and senior youth groups will continue to meet in person and online. It is important for parents (or youth) to let either myself or Mark Anderson (if you are grade 6-8) know if you are planning on joining via Zoom so we can set it up in advance.

I have been busy preparing Advent Calendar and Family Devotionals for everyone. If you have not received one, please let me know and I will happily deliver it to you. It is my hope that you have kept your Advent candles from last year or that you have a set of Advent candles to follow along the on the Sundays of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love... and of course Christmas Eve.

The family friendly devotional this year is called "Naming Jesus". Names matter, especially the ones we claim (or earn!) for ourselves. For Christians, nobody has more names and titles than Jesus, and during the season of Advent, we use as many of them as we can. We call them out in the middle of the night, like a child calling for their parent after a dream, like a lover searching for their beloved. By every name we can think of – some tender, some silly, some confusing, some magnificent – we invoke God's love made flesh and invite that love more fully into the world.

And then, on Christmas, Jesus comes bearing gifts: new names for us, the ones who so longed for him that we went searching with a whole litany of names on our lips.

For each of the four weeks of Advent (from the Latin for "coming" or "arrival"), we'll give you a practice to try, inspired by scripture and based on some of the names people have given to – or discovered for – Jesus over the years. Then we'll offer a few small things you might do together throughout the week to bring a little more meaning and mystery to your Christmas preparations and celebrations, plus a few fun "anytime" activities to do along the way.

This Advent, we hope you and your family will join us in some holy name calling – the names we give Jesus and the names he gives to us.

EGADZ DONATIONS

Egadz is a non-profit community-based organization providing programming and services to children, youth and their families in making healthy choices which improve their quality of life.

This year the Outreach Committee will be accepting donations for two Egadz programs:

- Ground Zero Youth Transitional Home a home with ten bedrooms providing an immediate, safe place to reside for thirty days at a time. Youth are aided in functioning on a positive psychological, sociological, physical and emotional level.
- **Egadz Outreach Program** a program providing a variety of supports to the community, including items for babies.

The Outreach Committee is gathering donations in three areas:

- *Hygiene* family size containers of shampoo, conditioner, bodywash, deodorant, toothpaste, and toothbrushes.
- Toques and Mitts suitable sizes for youth and young adults
- Baby Bags receiving blankets, baby wipes, baby hygiene products, baby bottles, soothers, baby thermometers, baby nail clippers, non-gender baby sleepers

The History of McClure's Refugee Efforts—Part Five

From 1991-1994 was a relative quiet time in our refugee story.

On July 27, 1995 the Mestrovic family of three arrived from Bosnia. One of the welcoming committee heard Paval (husband) say "Ah Canada, No war". Paval and Anika

welcoming committee heard Paval (husband) say "Ah Canada, No war". Paval and Anika (wife) spoke very little English. They attended group English classes sponsored by the government. Maja, their daughter, spoke haltingly.

It cost us about \$1200 per month to support the family. They all got their Canadian citizenship.

In 1998 the Audesh family was forced to leave their home and all of their possessions in Iraq, fear safety. They arrived in Saskatoon in August. The father was a medical doctor and the mother had college level education in accounting. They had four children aged 7-10; two girls and twin boys. This family was our sole responsibility until August 1999. They decided to move to Ontario to be closer to family. Father was unable to find employment in Saskatoon. In 2000 we heard that the father was trying to work for a drug company, the mother was taking English and the kids were enjoying school.
