Opening Prayer

God hovered over the void and breathed life into dust. God created in the wilderness. The Israelites wandered in the desert for forty years. They found God in the wilderness. Jesus said "no" to the tempter time and time again. And claimed his identity in the wilderness. We grow in the wilderness. We learn in the wilderness. God is with us—before, through, and after the wilderness. And we light this candle as a reminder of this. And wilderness will be our theme throughout Lent this year, as Lent does begin in the wilderness. The Spirit guides Jesus into the wilderness where he comes face to face with temptation and struggle. Yet, in his forty days of fasting, resisting, and wandering, Jesus is shaped and formed for his ministry. Similarly, through the wilderness of Lent, we are invited to surrender to the wild leadings of the Spirit. We rarely enter the wilderness willingly, but hopefully through our wandering we remember who we are and whose we are.

As you can see the candle is surrounded by elements of the wilderness. Instead of running away from the wilderness, we have brought the wilderness in—to face it, confront it, and find our way through it. These elements remind us of the many layers of the wilderness—in these layers we find meaning and the courage to carry on.

Sand accumulates slowly over time, wearing away from rock and stone, crystallizing tiny organisms and minerals into hard matter. In the deep crust of the earth, grains of sand compress into stone. Sand reminds us that the wilderness has history, for as long as there has been creation, there has been wilderness. Friends, the wilderness is somewhere we've been before.

In the winter, many trees let go of their leaves. Some trees need to be pruned in order to bear fruit. Trees remind us that we have to let go in order to start anew. And every spring, trees show us what it looks like to become new. In the wilderness, God is cheering for you. Friends, the wilderness is a place to begin again.

In the bible, the wilderness was often like a maze for the lost. Jacob wrestled with a mysterious angel through the night in the wilderness. The Israelites escaped to the desert and then wandered there for forty years. Jesus encountered the Samaritan woman alone by a well in the midday heat. But often, the wilderness was also a place to encounter the divine. When Jacob dreamt of a ladder leading to heaven, he placed a stone to mark the spot. He called the holy place "Beth-el"—God's house. Even when we are lost or walking in the dark, stones remind us that God is transforming our terrain into holy ground.

Moss has no roots and requires no soil. Instead, it grows on the face of stone. Moss is known for its hardiness—it can sustain drought, too much rain, and cold temperatures. Some mosses can grow again after being frozen for over a thousand years. Moss reminds us that the wilderness is a place of new life, of resilient life.

Friends, we learn who we are in the wilderness. We learn who God is in the wilderness. We learn how to take the next step, how to find comfort with the unknown, and how to trust God's call in the wilderness.

In the wilderness our faith is born, nurtured, challenged, and resurrected. Let us journey together, trusting that God is with us every step of the way.

Let us pray...

God of Creation,

The psalms remind us that even before a word is on our tongue, you know it completely. You know the prayers we bring before you today... prayers to ground our minds in your wisdom, open our hearts to your love and centre our bodies in this time of worship.

And you know too the prayers we offer, seeking freedom from all that might keep us from you—confessions of greed and doubt, fear and anxiety, conflict and regret. Free us from these sins.

Give us the strength to say "no" to anything that separates us from you, and "yes" to the things that let love grow. Guide us out of our self-created wilderness spaces and into your light. Gratefully we pray, amen.

Scripture: Matthew 4:1-22 (read by Meghan Drabble)

4 Then the Spirit led Jesus up into the wilderness so that the devil might tempt him. ² After Jesus had fasted for forty days and forty nights, he was starving. ³ The tempter came to him and said, "Since you are God's Son, command these stones to become bread."

⁴ Jesus replied, "It's written, *People won't live only by bread, but by every word spoken by God."*^[a]

⁵ After that the devil brought him into the holy city and stood him at the highest point of the temple. He said to him, ⁶ "Since you are God's Son, throw yourself down; for it is written, *I will command my angels concerning you, and they will take you up in their hands so that you won't hit your foot on a stone.*"^[b]

⁷ Jesus replied, "Again it's written, Don't test the Lord your God."[c]

⁸ Then the devil broug ht him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their glory. ⁹ He said, "I'll give you all these if you bow down and worship me." ¹⁰ Jesus responded, "Go away, Satan, because it's written, *You will worship the Lord your God and serve only him."*^{[d] 11} The devil left him, and angels came and took care of him.
