


Life happens...church life is happening.

OUTREACH & REFUGEE COMMITTEE

The History of McClure's Refugee Efforts—Part Six



In year 2000, the Refugee Committee continued to meet and support a number of individuals in different ways but had no major sponsorships.

In 2003, we sponsored a single man, **Ater Cagai from Sudan**. He was born in 1982. His father was killed in 1987; his mother fled and left Ater in an orphanage in Waw. In 1989, Ater (7 years old) was abducted by the government to join the army, but was rescued in 1991 and went back to the city of Waw where he joined up with the Loi family.

In 2000, the Loi family were accepted as government sponsored refugees, but not Ater. He remained in Waw, working illegally where he could have been deported back to Sudan if arrested.

Ater arrived here in 2003 under our sponsorship. The last word we had was that he was working at the Granary here in Saskatoon.

On June 3, 2005, the **Sudat family** of five from Afghanistan arrived in Saskatoon. They had four sons aged 13 to 19 years old. We were able to get a three bedroom apartment for them on Appleby Dr for \$550/month. An update from them in 2009 stated that they had moved to Avenue K South. The youngest boy was in Grade 10 and the two oldest boys were at the University of Regina. The third boy, in Grade 12, was thinking of going into one of the trades. They thanked the Refugee Committee for all that we did for them.

All of the Refugee articles that have been printed in the Newsletter have been written by Joye Binnie, using the Refugee Committee minutes as a reference.

Thank you, Joye, for refreshing our memories of the caring and faithful work of the Refugee Committee and McClure congregation over the years.

How is McClure's Outreach Money assigned?

The Outreach Committee would like to keep the congregation informed of how and where the funds in our budget are assigned.

We plan to present 2 or 3 agencies per newsletter.

We consider agencies in these categories: In the World, In the Community and In the Congregation. For each potential agency we also consider their other funding, such as government funding, major sponsors, or fundraising efforts. We also look at emerging issues and needs in society.

The agencies presented this month:

1. St Andrew's College (World): equips those people, called by God, for the work of ministry within the United Church of Canada.
2. Out Saskatoon (Community): the centre serves all genders and sexual orientations, by addressing underlying issues which affect the health and welfare of people in this community
3. Outreach Education Honoraria (Congregation): pays for guest speakers in the area of mission. Past events have included Mental Health Conversations and the Blanket Exercise. (With Covid concerns, we may not be able to have the usual gatherings).

REPORT FROM THE BOARD CHAIR OF McCLURE PLACE ASSOCIATION INC.

January 19, 2022

The Board of McClure Place Association Inc. (MPAI) has had a rather busy time since last summer for a number of reasons, which are only very briefly highlighted in this newsletter item.

As many in the Tower and at Amy's will know, and also the Church, we have had some ongoing challenges with our building heating system. Starting in the summer of 2021, we initiated work to upgrade our boiler system and to flush the piping system used to convey the heat to each area of our building. In short, while much of the work has gone well, we have had some ongoing challenges, which relate in large measure to the build-up of sludge in our piping system, which in turn has impacted various aspects of our boiler operation. At the moment, it seems that, through the work of our contractors, we are getting a good handle on the situation and, fortunately, we were able to maintain good heat in the building throughout our very cold weather over the Christmas period. We hope to wrap up all aspects of this work by spring.

Another significant project that is just now well underway is the upgrading of the fire alarm system in the Tower. Among other things, the work involves the installation of alarm devices in most of the rooms of each of the 108 suites in the building so that residents can more easily hear an alarm should it be sounded. The upgraded system will also make it easier for residents to hear any announcements that are made through the public address system. This work is somewhat invasive in that the contractors must spend some time in each suite as they undertake the necessary device installations.

One of the major initiatives of this Board year, which will likely to continue into the next Board year as well, is our need to address the financial impacts of the conclusion of our agreement with the Saskatchewan Housing Corporation (SHC) in April 2024. As many will know, when the Tower was built and began operations in spring 1989, about one-third of the suites were designated for those on relatively low income. Beyond April 2024, we will no longer have the financial support of SHC, and thus we are now considering how we might continue this important aspect of the McClure mission. At this juncture, the work is being led by our SHC Exit Strategy working group, and in due course there will be a full report made to the Board and the membership.

Another initiative, which is being led by our Governance Committee, is an updating of what we refer to as the Board Manual. This manual is more or less a working document related to the implementation of the MPAI bylaw (Bylaw No. 1). Much of the updating simply relates to changes in our operations as they have evolved over the past few years. There are a few other items on this committee's agenda that we also hope to tackle this Board year.

The McClure Place Foundation was established shortly after MPAI was made operational. It is a registered charitable organization, which has a mandate to improve the lives of residents in the McClure Place facility. While legally separate from MPAI, and initially had its own Board, it was rolled into a committee of MPAI a few years ago. The committee is referred to as the Resource Development Committee and is a standing committee of the MPAI Board.

For the most part, the major initiative of the Foundation was its focus on paying off the mortgage of Amy McClure House, which was wrapped up in 2018. Now, the members of the Resource Development Committee, which leads the work of the Foundation on behalf of the Board, is actively considering how the Foundation might be rejuvenated. Although the work on this matter is just beginning, there is a strong sense that there is no shortage of opportunity for how the Foundation can contribute to the McClure mission on a go-forward basis. We hope to have more to report on this work by the end of this Board year or perhaps next year.

The third of the three standing committees of the MPAI Board is that of Finance and Audit (F&A). This committee is very active on a relatively routine basis throughout the Board year. Meetings are held monthly, financial statements are reviewed quarterly, the annual budget is approved annually, and the annual audits of both MPAI and the Foundation are overseen.

Of course, the MPAI Finance Manager provides the frontline support in virtually all of these initiatives. In addition, to date this year, F&A has invested some time in developing a Capital Reserve Policy, which is expected to be brought to the Board for approval at the February Board meeting. There are also one or two other initiatives that will be undertaken by F&A in due course.


