Scripture Exodus 17:1-7

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the LORD commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. ²The people quarreled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you guarrel with me? Why do you test the LORD?" ³But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" ⁴So Moses cried out to the LORD, "What shall I do with this people?" They are almost ready to stone me." ⁵The LORD said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. ⁶I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. ⁷He called the place Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites guarreled and tested the LORD, saying, "Is the LORD among us or not?"

May God bless to our understanding and our living these words of scripture. Amen.

Reflection

Prayer: May the words of my mouth and the meditation of our hearts be acceptable to you O God, our strength and our redeemer. Amen.

This week we learned of the death of two significant leaders one here in this country and one in the United States. Here in Canada we mourn the death of John Turner, 17th Prime Minister of Canada. Brian Mulroney says of John Turner that he was a "true gentleman" who brought a great sense of dignity to his long career as a politician. Mr. Turner is described in a CBC article as a humble man with a strong social conscience who supported many charitable organizations including Mount Sinai Hospital in Toronto, he was an honorary director of the World Wildlife Fund in Canada and an advocate for the protection of Canada's lakes and rivers. He served his family and country with great dignity, his legacy and commitment to public service will be remembered for generations. In an interview John Turner talked about the privilege of serving his fellow Canadians. As I read about John Turner's life I discovered that he was also a man of faith and do you know how I discovered this, apparently in the early 60s he had a relationship with Princess Margaret, in fact, letters found several years after their relationship ended indicate that Princess Margaret was interested in marrying him, the problem however was that John Turner was Catholic and Buckingham Palace would not approve of the match. John Turner was a man with faith filled roots.

This week we were also informed of the death of Ruth Bader Ginsburg, long serving member of the supreme court in the United States, I must admit I didn't know much about her until this past week but as I read some of the tributes that have been shared about her I am impressed and inspired. Ruth Bader Ginsburg was a tireless advocate for women's rights in the United States, she drafted legislation that gave women the ability to have a mortgage without a male co-signer, and for women to have her own credit cards she was also instrumental in assuring women's reproductive rights. I was fascinated to know that though she graduated at the top of her class in Law school she could not find work as a lawyer; she said there were three things against her: one she was married, two she had a baby and three she was Jewish. Ruth Bader Ginsburg was a woman of faith. These words are attributed to her: if you want to be a true professional you will do something outside yourself something to repair tears in your community something to make life a little better for people less fortunate than you that's what I think a meaningful life is, living not for oneself but for one's community. Ruth Bader Ginsburg was a woman with faith filled roots.

In the light of the loss of these leaders comes our scripture lesson from exodus today. Once again, our lesson invites us to consider the people of God and their time in the wilderness. Last week it seemed easy too equate

our experience in wilderness with the people of Israel, we could see ourselves perhaps in the lives of those who were complaining, frustrated, tired and hungry. In this week's lesson the people are, a bit further down the road but now they are thirsty. And they are still complaining to their leader, Moses. But this week I invite us to **not** equate ourselves with the complaining ones but rather to acquaint ourselves with Moses their leader.

Have you ever felt like Moses? Have you ever felt like the one who is absorbing the pain, frustration and grief of others? Have you ever felt that burden of responsibility that comes with people turning towards you, looking to you: to help, to lead, to feed, to take care.

It's funny isn't it that because we don't see ourselves in the same category as a John Turner or a Ruth Bader Ginsburg or even that of a Moses we have a tendency to downplay our **own** leadership, within our circles of influence. We forget that John Turner and Ruth Bader Ginsburg did not start out to be great leaders but rather they started out being people of faith committed to compassion and justice. It was this deep commitment to compassion and justice that made them exceptional.

If you recall Moses did not see himself as a great leader in the beginning either in fact he complained often to God that he didn't have the skills that were necessary to lead the people of Israel out of slavery and into the promised land but he was a person of faith and that faith caused him to see differently. Moses didn't chose his leadership roll it was given to him by a God that saw more in him then he could ever see. And when Moses was faced with a complaining, thirsty people, he knew that the way through the wilderness was found in his roots – in this God who had chosen him. Moses turned to the God power.

Marianne Williamson writes:

"Our deepest fear is not that we are inadequate. Our deepest fear is that we are powerful beyond measure. It is our light, not our darkness that most frightens us. We ask ourselves, 'Who am I to be brilliant, gorgeous, talented, fabulous?' Actually, who are you not to be? You are a child of God. Your playing small does not serve the world. There is nothing enlightened about shrinking so that other people won't feel insecure around you. We are all meant to shine, as children do. We were born to make manifest the glory of God that is within us. It's not just in some of us; it's in everyone. And as we let our own light shine, we unconsciously give other people permission to do the same. As we are liberated from our own fear, our presence automatically liberates others.

I believe we are all leaders - we are leaders in big and small ways but each of us have others looking to us for support, example and love. Whether that be within our families, amongst our friends, in our communities, in our places of work, within our schools, within our church, within our city. Whether we are caring for a pet or a loved one, whether we are a member of the car club or the Outreach committee, whether we have a small group of friends or a whole stadium full. Whether we are young, not so young, not yet old or older there are others looking to us. We are all leaders. And let's face it – it has not been easy to be a leader in these days of wilderness.

Our kids need us to make hard decisions about their safety, and our parents need us to be present. Our partners need our energy and our work needs our time. Our community needs volunteers and our church is calling us to serve others. As elders our families look to us for assurance and our friends seek our company. And as we tend to all this we feel our own hunger and thirst and the need to tend to our own mental health. I think we can understand Moses and the heaviness of his time and place.

So what do we do?

Well we are people rooted in our faith and our scripture lesson suggests that first we lament or share our concern with the God Power that gives us strength. And then we dive deep into our faith and we will find a God who provides food for the hungry and drink for the thirsty. A faith that is about compassion and justice, a faith that leads the leaders and assures all that we are not alone and that whatever we do - it is enough.
