Reflection

During that time we have had so many faithful leaders... so many people who have committed themselves to this congregation with their time, talents and treasure. And we are incredibly grateful to ever single one of you... we would not... could not... be the church without you.

Thank you so much to everyone who shared with us... thank you for helping to make this anniversary so special.

Over the years there have been many changes in this community... location changes, building changes, staff changes, culture and community changes. But one of the things that has not changed is our commitment to worship, to study, to care and to outreach.

This past year has been one of the more challenging years as we experience some pretty significant changes. Certainly there has been much grief, frustration, concern as we live in this pandemic.

But one thing that has not changed is our commitment to be the church. I've often heard it said that the church is much more than Sunday morning. Sunday morning worship is certainly a time for us to come together in community to worship God, celebrate, make connections and hopefully be inspired, refreshed by our experience of worship through the music, the prayers, the scripture and maybe even the sermon.

But that is not where church ends... in fact, it's only really a beginning. As the children's song from my youth says "the church is not a building, the church is not a steeple, the church is not a resting place... the church is a people. I am the church, you are the church, we are the church together."

So we have been trying to use our creative brains to figure out how we can continue to be a vibrant church while maintaining social distance and respecting the pandemic guidelines and restrictions. We've had to learn a lot of new technology so we could continue offering worship on Sunday morning, opportunities for study, connection and outreach. We've offered online social times, discussions and studies... committees have had to shift to an online format for meetings... families have received faith at home kits, Rainbow Village, the youth and young adult groups have all been gathering online. We've continued our commitment to outreach... this summer offering opportunities to support The Lighthouse, The Friendship Inn and The Food Bank... and just this week offering a bottle drive to support Cosmo Industries. And we have definitely been lighting up the phone lines as we do our best to connect with every member of this community... especially those who do not have the use of technology.

And it looks like we are going to need to continue being creative in how we are the church as we move into the colder season. Unfortunately, Debra and I have a limited capacity for creativity... and this is why the "we are the church together" part of that song is so so so so oo important.

There are already a number of folks tapping into their creativity to keep this congregation alive... but we sure could use the help of the entire community so that we can live out our commitment to "be the church" in all our capacity.

No one... not one of you... are too old, too young, too tired, too depressed, too busy, too anything... to be the church. Being the church does not need

to just be doing the big things... being the church can be as simple as making a call, writing a note or just sitting quietly in prayer.

Wherever you are... whatever your ability... there is a role for you. So please.. connect with us – tell us what you are doing – or what you would like to be doing. If there is a program, a ministry, a job, a study, a discussion... anything... that you would like to do – or would like to see being done – let us know. Please... share your ideas, your desires, your needs. Help us be the church our community needs during this pandemic time.

As we move into our 55th year as a congregation let's all consider how we can continue to bring McClure United Church to life... living and loving in the way of Jesus.
