Full to the Brim

It was such a joy to have folks return to in-person worship for the season of Advent and Christmas, followed by disappointment when the rise in Omicron numbers forced us back to online only. That has been a pattern over the past two years; anticipation and hope followed by disappointment. But imagine how much worse everything would have felt if that thread of hope (no matter how small) hadn't been with us! Hope is a thread that wraps itself around the struggles, fears, worries and burdens of our lives. It is one of the more important threads in the weaving of our faith. Without hope, well, I can't even imagine what a life without hope would be like.

As we move together now into the season of Lent, hope is brought to the forefront. This is a time when we reflect on the life of Jesus. We know how the story goes. We know about the corruption that led to his death. But we also know that his death isn't the end of the story. The story of our faith ends in new life. It is hope in new life that allows us to enter into this story year after year.

This Lent we will be using another wonderful resource from [A Sanctified Art](#) (a collective of artists and theologians writing liturgy and creating resources). The theme for Lent this year is **Full to the Brim** and here is a beautiful description, from [A Sanctified Art](#), of where our Lenten journey will take us:

"The origins of Lent were that one was to leave their old life behind to fast and prepare to be baptized into a new way of living. In essence, this was a practice of stepping away from corrupt power, scarcity mentality, and empty rituals in order to live a more expansive and full life of faith. And so, our Lenten theme, Full to the Brim, is an invitation—into a radically different Lent, into a full life. It's an invitation to be authentically who you are, to counter scarcity and injustice at every turn, to pour out even more grace wherever it is needed. When we allow ourselves to be filled to the brim with God's lavish love, that love spills over. It reaches beyond ourselves; like water, it rushes and flows, touching everything in its path. Full to the Brim reminds us to live fully—as we pursue justice and hope, or express grief and gratitude. And so, this Lent, let us trust—fully—that we belong to God. Let us increase our capacity to receive and give grace. Let us discover the expansive life God dreams for us."

Let us discover the expansive life God dreams for us! This is our thread of hope for Lent this year. And how WONDERFUL that those who are ready will be able to come together once again for in-person worship as we begin this journey. And it is equally wonderful that we now have the technology in place to allow those who are not yet ready for in-person gatherings to join us online. I would really like to encourage you to give the livestream a try. I know it is convenient to watch worship when it is more convenient for you to do so, but I do think there is something quite beautiful in knowing that we are spread out across the city and beyond the city limits – each in their own homes – yet deeply connected by God's love and the hope of our faith as we worship together – at the same time.

Let's allow ourselves this Lent to be filled to the brim with God's lavish love.

Reflection - Congregational Meeting Feb. 27, 2022

Last year, February 7, 2021 at this very meeting, Laura led a reflection, having asked the question, "what has it meant to be church during a pandemic?"

I remember hearing the following: "First and foremost McClure is a community, a community of friends with a vision, who were willing to put faith into action years ago." That community saw a need in the wider community. In faith, McClure ventured into unknown territory to meet the need.

I can't help but think...what have we done this past year but venture into unknown territory? And who better to walk with us along this unknown path, but Debra and Laura. Thank you from the bottom of our hearts.

So where have we ventured in 2022?

Well...

1. Because of our online presence we have been able to connect with congregation members and young adults who no longer live in Saskatoon.
2. We try to be the church... we've had collection projects and raised funds for Egadz, Socks for the Homeless, and refugee support.
3. We connected via spring and fall phoning trees, have had "adapted" bake sales, and came *this* close to a book and puzzle sale...it might happen yet!
4. We prepared and distributed Advent kits, held Sunday School for the kids, and met online and in person with youth and young adults.
5. We were guided by the work of the Building Access Task Group who researched and helped us make decisions about how to use the building while keeping everyone safe and with respect for residents who make the McClure space their home.
6. In different but meaningful ways, we have celebrated life at Funerals, Baptisms, and Marriages.
7. We have embarked on a new way to connect with the wider church community using the Rural Connect program.
8. And we have been held together by our wonderful music team, Irene, our Office Manager and Finance guru, Pam, who does data entry and a whole lot of other tasks, and now Claudia, our new Administrative Assistant.
9. It's tricky to name names but Norm Sampson and Adam Brookman just about moved their beds in to work on set-up and tweaking of the equipment for Rural Connect and live streaming. We thank the office volunteers who, with Irene, took on the task of registering people for in-building worship. Oh yes, we also got back into our Sanctuary for Worship services and *will do so again!*
10. Finally, I especially want to mention Elaine Niebergall our Treasurer, who truly treats every donation as a gift!

SEE YOU SOON!

Lent is a great time to create a habit of spiritual practices... Why is this important? Of course, we want to bring our children up to know and experience these spiritual practices because we want to raise them to know and love God, to be disciples of Jesus Christ, to be guided and shaped by love of God and neighbor. But if we need other, perhaps more tangible reasons, we can look at the research of the Search Institute and its work on developmental assets. They have identified 40 assets that help children and youth grow into healthy adults. The more of these 40 assets a child or teen has in his/her life, the less likely he or she is to engage in high-risk behaviors and the more likely he or she is to become a happy, successful adult. Regular (weekly or more) participation in a religious community is on that list. And so are various values that are reinforced by the practice of spiritual disciplines including: service to others, caring, concern for equality and social justice, integrity, honesty, responsibility, healthy lifestyle, peaceful conflict resolution, and a sense of purpose for one's life.

So here are a 3 spiritual practices, you may want to explore with your children and/or teens.

Paying attention. Simply paying attention is about as basic as it gets. But it can also be challenging in our world today. Young children are good at noticing. They notice bugs and flowers and the way a pea rolls around on the plate. That gives us a natural way to connect the things they notice to God the Creator. "Thank you, God, for creating that cool bug." "Wow, God makes some beautiful flowers!" etc. As children grow into tweens and teens, they become more distracted by a lot of the same things that distract us. So, we can help them (and ourselves) by simply inviting them to notice, to pay attention, to look for signs of God all around them. "I see the beauty of God's creation in the sunrise." "I see God's compassion in you in the way you care for your friend."

Blessing. Henri Nouwen writes, "To give a blessing is to affirm, to say 'yes' to a person's belovedness. And more than that: to give a blessing creates the reality of which it speaks." There's great power in helping children and youth (and adults, for that matter) know that they are beloved by God. Parents can bless children and youth as they head out for the day or on particular occasions, such as a birthday or the start of a new school year. Our congregations can bless children and teenagers as they're promoted to new grades, as they participate in special activities, as they take on special roles in the church, as they begin to serve others. All of us can look for opportunities to say to one another: "You are God's beloved. God delights in you."

Sharing Gifts. This is about finding ways to be generous. We can help kids think about simple ways they can use their own money (allowance, birthday money, money they earned) to help others—buying a pair of socks or gloves to help someone who's homeless; donating to an animal shelter, helping to build a well where there is no clean water, etc. Kids understand these acts of generosity. But we can remind them that they can also be generous in other ways—with their time, with their ideas, with the way they regard others, etc.

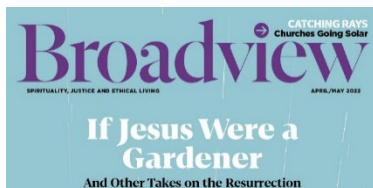

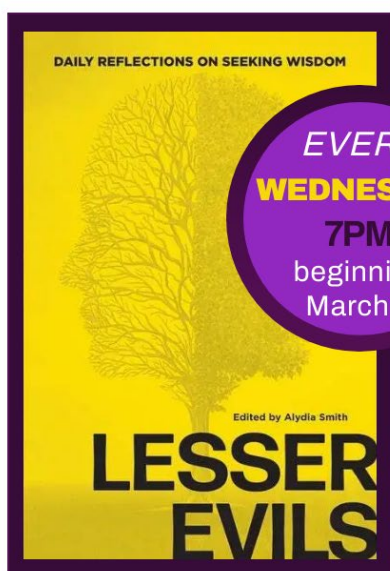

Donations have come in from McClure folks, but also from people stopping in after seeing the hearts. Thank you for everyone's generosity and concern for refugee issues around the world. Feel free to keep donating, although our wonderful heart display and sign will have to make way for other exciting McClure news in March.



A REFUGEE'S STORY

Some of you may remember that in the spring of 2021, we were looking for donations of some household items for Daniel, a refugee from Honduras. Daniel had escaped Honduras and made his way into Canada, arriving on Christmas Eve of 2019. He was alone in the dead of winter, with only the clothes on his back. Daniel shared his story (through a translator) with our McClure youth earlier this year. His journey is a harrowing story, helping us understand the plight of refugees, but also one of hope. Daniel has agreed to share his story with the congregation through an in-person evening event, that will also be live streamed. This event will be held later in April. So watch for the details in the April newsletter. You won't want to miss it.

How is McClure's Outreach Money assigned?

The Outreach Committee would like to keep the congregation informed of how and where the funds in our budget are assigned.
We plan to present 2 or 3 agencies per newsletter.

We consider agencies in these categories: In the World, In the Community and In the Congregation. For each potential agency we also consider their other funding, such as government funding, major sponsors, or fundraising efforts. We also look at emerging issues and needs in society.

The agencies presented this month:

1. Canadian Food Grains Bank (World): provides food to the world's most vulnerable and impoverished people
2. Northern Saskatchewan Hospital Chaplaincy (Community): Provides pastoral care and companionship to UCC hospital patients (note #1: Spiritual Care has been cut from our hospitals. Note#2: during the pandemic, only this chaplain has been allowed to visit. Note #3: due to decrease in Mission and Service Funds, this is position is now only half time)
3. Crisis Emergency (Congregation): The Ministry staff determines the use of these funds, intended to help those persons (known to the Minister) in immediate need of practical resources.

Residents are grateful to the staff who have looked after our needs during this pandemic. At present we have few restrictions, and we hope to keep it that way. We can participate in group activities while wearing masks. Coffee, exercise, yoga, bingo, Writers Circle, and cards are ongoing. Rev. Debra Berg is showing the Sunday service on the new TV on Tuesdays. The movie, “Come From Away” was enjoyed one afternoon. The musical about all the planes landing in Gander during 9/11 is an excellent production.

The fire alarm system in McClure Place is being upgraded; every suite will have alarms in the living room and in each bedroom plus new smoke detectors. Our General Meeting was postponed in January due to worries re Covid. We plan to meet on February 28, 2022 when hopefully it will feel safer to have a large group together. Bouquets, concerns, and questions are discussed to inform us about what we have appreciated and if any issues that need attention.

Valentine cookies made by the kitchen staff were enjoyed at coffee time. We look forward to a “Back to the Homestead” event., A time to wear an apron, bonnet and farmer’s dress! Our Globe Walkers from the tower and Amy McClure did 2883 km in January.

Residents knitted or crocheted 121 toques, mitts, neck warmers and scarves which were donated to King George School. McClure Place for several years has been the first step in cutting out the pillows for CARG,(Coronary Artery Rehabilitation Group.). This program provides individuals with a heart pillow following cardiac surgery.

As restrictions of the pandemic lessen, each of us will have to find our level of comfort in managing our lives. Hopefully all residents can stay safe and enjoy the days as we approach spring. We will say goodbye to Mel Hitchings, our Maintenance Manager. Mel was so helpful to our residents, and we wish him well. Our thoughts are with those who have been in hospital or have lost a friend or loved one.
