Welcome and Announcements

Hello everyone and a great big warm welcome to all of you on this cold day. Seems as though winter is arriving... I'm not going to complain as we have had a beautiful fall and I appreciate that the snow held off until the second week of November. This time last year we were still digging ourselves out of one of the biggest snowfalls in my memory.

So today we have a guest joining us for the reflection time.

I'm grateful to welcome Jessica Baird from Ottawa who will be sharing with us. I hope you will be as inspired by her story and her faith as I have been.

One of the good things about this pandemic.... and that feels a bit odd to say.... but, its true... there have been a few good things... and one of those things is the ability to use technology to make connections and be creative in sharing leadership across the country. I'm happy to be able to take advantage of this while we are still pre-recording our worship services.

Because soon... things are going to change.

As you have probably heard we are planning for a return to in person worship on the first Sunday of Advent.... November 28th. I am so very excited to be gathering again with others in the sanctuary on Sunday morning... and I am also excited that we now have the technological ability to include all those who are not able or not yet ready to return to in person worship.

You will have received more detailed information about the protocols in today's email so I'm going to just give you the reader's digest version here.

We will be offering two worship times... 9:15 and 11am... and are limiting numbers at each service to 75 people to allow for some physical distancing.

We are putting into place other safety protocols as well...

everyone will be required to pre-register for worship to ensure that we don't go over our limit and you will also be required to show proof of vaccination either at the time of registration or prior to worship on Sunday morning.

You can pre-register in a few different ways... you can register in person by dropping by the office during regular office hours... you can email your intent to attend to the church office

(mcclureunitedchurch@shaw.ca) or you can phone the church office Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday between 9am and noon. All registrations... by phone, email or drop in must be received by noon on the Friday prior each week.

To simplify things on Sunday morning, it is our hope that as many of you as possible will provide your proof of vaccination prior to Sunday morning. You can either pop into the office to show your proof... or you can email it If you are comfortable with emailing your proof of vaccination, it will be deleted immediately after being seen. We will not be keeping copies of your proof of vaccination on file for privacy reasons... a note will just be made that your proof has been seen so you will only need to show your proof the first time you register for worship.

We do not want to exclude those of you who are unable to receive the vaccination so we will also accept a negative covid test result and it must not be dated more than 72 hours prior to worship.... so that's Thursday

at noon. If this is the option you will chose, please be sure to check the detailed email for which covid tests are accepted – there are some limitations.

And finally... for those of you not able to or not quite comfortable yet attending in person worship, we will be livestreaming the 9:15 service. This means you will be able to watch the service in real time from the comfort of your homes. This service will also be recorded, so if you are unable to watch at 9:15 you will be able to watch later in the day.

And that's a lot of detail but don't worry if you didn't catch it all or forget things because it was also sent in the email and will be posted on our website as well.

I'm sure this announcement comes with some mixed emotions... excitement, apprehension.. maybe some worry and possibly concern over some of the safety protocols. Please know that if you have any questions or concerns that you would like to talk about, we are here for you. We are in this together and want to do our best to support and encourage each other as we move forward. So give us a call, send an email or stop by the office.

And, may I also ask that you please be patient with us as we try and test how to move forward. We've never done this before and, while we feel like we have a solid plan.... Well, these past 20 months have taught us that plans are always changing and we need to be flexible in our approach to.. well, life.

There are other announcements as well but I am going to just leave those for you to look at in the email, on the Facebook page or our website. All the details you need can be found in those places.

Prayers of the People
